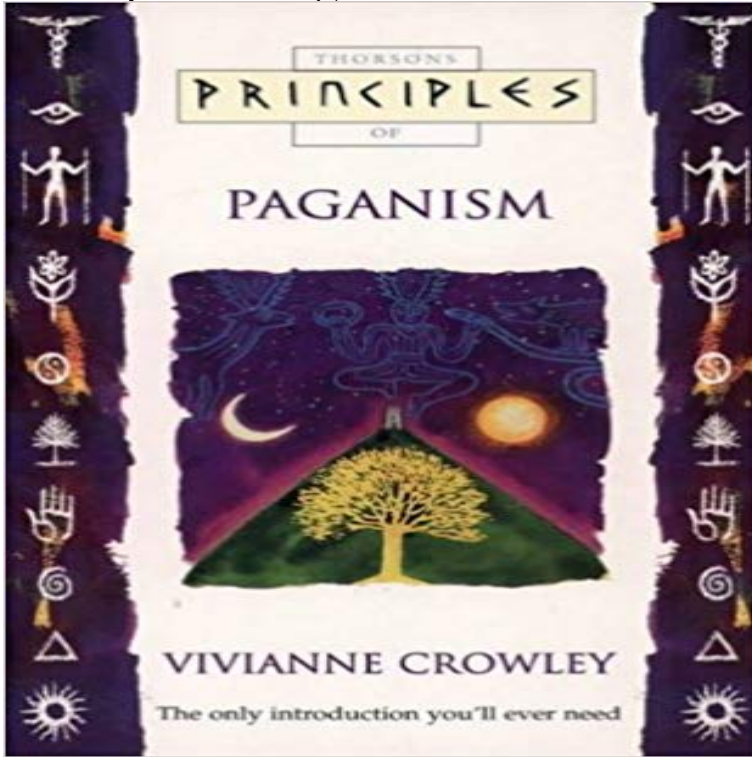


# Principles of Paganism
