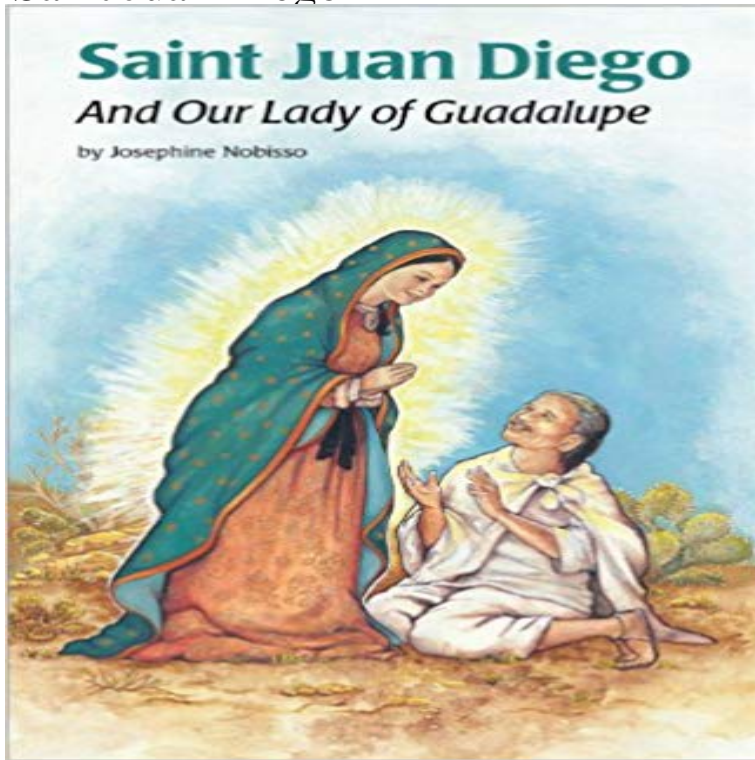


# Saint Juan Diego
