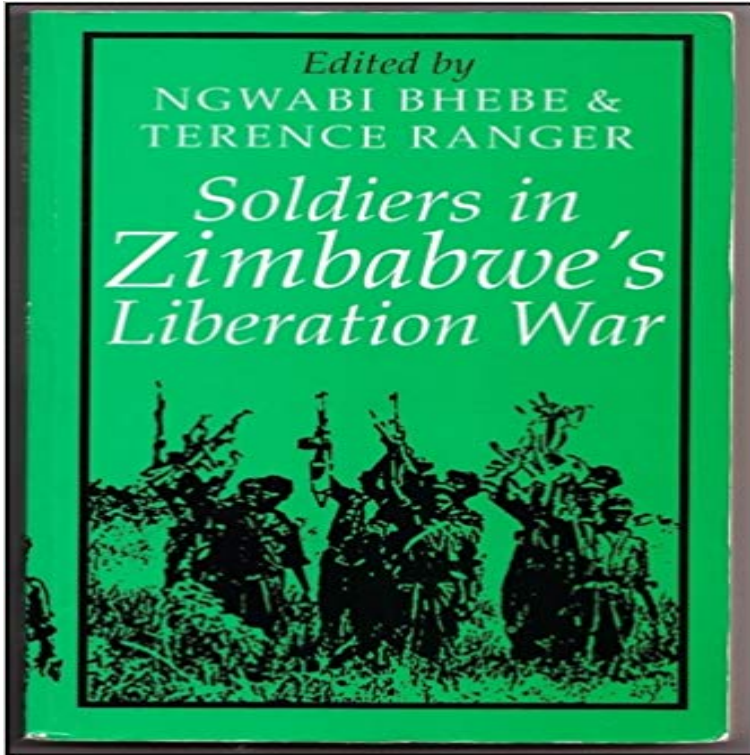


Soldiers in Zimbabwe's Liberation War (Social History of Africa)
