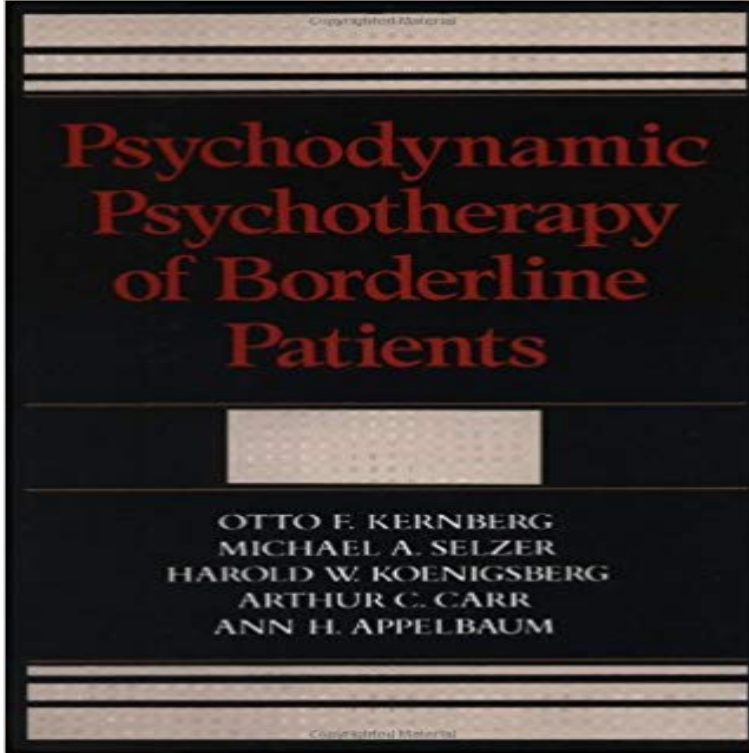


Psychodynamic Psychotherapy Of Borderline Patients
